ABOUT THE BRAND PERFORMANCE CHECK

Fair Wear Foundation believes that improving conditions for apparel product location workers requires change at many levels. Traditional efforts to improve conditions focus primarily on the product location. FWF, however, believes that the management decisions of clothing brands have an enormous influence for good or ill on product location conditions.

FWF's Brand Performance Check is a tool to evaluate and report on the activities of FWF's member companies. The Checks examine how member company management systems support FWF's Code of Labour Practices. They evaluate the parts of member company supply chains where clothing is assembled. This is the most labour intensive part of garment supply chains, and where brands can have the most influence over working conditions.

In most apparel supply chains, clothing brands do not own product locations, and most product locations work for many different brands. This means that in most cases FWF member companies have influence, but not direct control, over working conditions. As a result, the Brand Performance Checks focus primarily on verifying the efforts of member companies. Outcomes at the product location level are assessed via audits and complaint reports, however the complexity of the supply chains means that even the best efforts of FWF member companies cannot guarantee results.

Even if outcomes at the product location level cannot be guaranteed, the importance of good management practices by member companies cannot be understated. Even one concerned customer at a product location can have significant positive impacts on a range of issues like health and safety conditions or freedom of association. And if one customer at a product location can demonstrate that improvements are possible, other customers no longer have an excuse not to act. The development and sharing of these types of best practices has long been a core part of FWF's work.

The Brand Performance Check system is designed to accommodate the range of structures and strengths that different companies have, and reflects the different ways that brands can support better working conditions.

This report is based on interviews with member company employees who play important roles in the management of supply chains, and a variety of documentation sources, financial records, supplier data. The findings from the Brand Performance Check are summarized and published at www.fairwear.org. The online Brand Performance Check Guide provides more information about the indicators.

Summary:

Albiro has shown progress and met most of FWF's performance requirements. With a monitoring percentage of 97.5%, it meets the monitoring threshold required by members after three years of membership. Therefore, Albiro is awarded the 'Good' category, with a total of 71 points.

Albiro has a strategy in place to limit the number of Group 2 suppliers, which are mostly in the tail end of the supply chain. It has ceased relationships with two out of three Chinese intermediaries. Furthermore, it has organised WEP-basic training at three of its suppliers. Also, a training session on labour standards took place at a Vietnamese supplier. Communication is once again in line with FWF policies. In 2016, Albiro managed to successfully raise wages at one of its Macedonian suppliers.

FWF encourages Albiro to continue its work on living wages and social dialogue at its Group 1 suppliers and to actively share its best practices with other FWF members. FWF also strongly recommends further consolidation of its Group 2 suppliers to ensure increased leverage, monitoring and active remediation.

Albiro should still improve its pricing policy, especially for Group 2 suppliers, and should work closely with these suppliers to prevent the occurrence of excessive overtime. Furthermore, it should ensure that its intermediaries are aware of FWF requirements and follow up on improving working conditions.

PERFORMANCE CATEGORY OVERVIEW

Leader: This category is for member companies who are doing exceptionally well, and are operating at an advanced level. Leaders show best practices in complex areas such as living wages and freedom of association.

Good: It is FWF's belief that member companies who are making a serious effort to implement the Code of Labour Practices—the vast majority of FWF member companies—are 'doing good' and deserve to be recognized as such. They are also doing more than the average clothing company, and have allowed their internal processes to be examined and publicly reported on by an independent NGO. The majority of member companies will receive a 'Good' rating.

Needs Improvement: Member companies are most likely to find themselves in this category when major unexpected problems have arisen, or if they are unable or unwilling to seriously work towards CoLP implementation. Member companies may be in this category for one year only after which they should either move up to Good, or will be moved to suspended.

Suspended: Member companies who either fail to meet one of the Basic Requirements, have had major internal changes which means membership must be put on hold for a maximum of one year, or have been in Needs Improvement for more than one year. Member companies may remain in this category for one year maximum, after which termination proceedings will come into force.

Categories are calculated based on a combination of benchmarking score and the percentage of own production under monitoring. The specific requirements for each category are outlined in the Brand Performance Check Guide.

Comment: Albiro has taken steps to further increase its leverage at suppliers. It has taken steps to consolidate its supplier list to 41 active suppliers and subcontractors. It buys 64% of its production from 5 suppliers in Macedonia, Morocco and Bosnia. At several of its suppliers, it is the only customer.

Comment: Albiro still has a significant number of suppliers where it only has little leverage, limiting its ability to actively monitor and follow up. Its strategy is to reduce its tail. In China, it has shifted production from three agents to one agent to ensure that production shifts less between suppliers. It has an active policy in place to limit the number of suppliers where it has little leverage.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to continue pursuing an active strategy to limit the number of suppliers where it has little leverage, limiting its ability to improve working conditions.

Comment: Albiro values long-term relationships. With most of its suppliers it has been actively working to improve labour standards for more than five years.

Comment: Albiro requires suppliers to sign the CoLP before first orders are placed. In China, Albiro is using an intermediary to plan production. This intermediary is a member of BSCI. Albiro requires the intermediary to ensure that new suppliers sign the FWF Code of Labour Practices before production starts. For all its new suppliers in 2016, Albiro has received a signed questionnaire.

Comment: Albiro prefers to place orders at new suppliers that are a member of FWF or BSCI. In most countries, it visits the supplier before placing orders and discusses labour standards and high risk country issues. It uses the FWF health and check when onsite. It uses a checklist including labour standards during these discussions. It actively collects and checks existing audit reports. A number of countries are excluded from sourcing; partially due to human rights concerns, but also because Albiro wants to concentrate on a limited number of countries. The CSR officer is aware of human rights risks per country that Albiro sources from, but it has not yet been integrated into the organization in a systematic manner.

In 2016, Albiro worked with three intermediaries in Asian countries. The intermediaries visited the suppliers and checked whether suppliers are a member of BSCI, although not all production locations were a member of BSCI. Albiro ended relationships with two intermediaries.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to train its Chinese intermediary on conducting human rights due diligence and integrate specific risks in China and Vietnam in its selection procedure.

Furthermore, FWF recommends Albiro to ensure that knowledge about country specific risks is properly documented and integrated in its organizational and decision-making processes. It could also extend its questionnaire with more specific questions, like on wages or country specific information.

Comment: Albiro rates its six most important suppliers in an annual management review according to criteria such as price, quality and sustainability. For social sustainability, a maximum of 5 out of 75 points can be scored, another 5 points for environmental sustainability. In a separate assessment, suppliers are rated based on their compliance with the eight labour standards based on audit results. These assessments are only discussed with the suppliers when they are not performing well enough.

As Albiro usually uses each supplier for a specific product it is difficult to reward compliant suppliers with more orders.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to extend the evaluation of social sustainability with more indicators that are related to the performance of factories on social standards. It could discuss an evaluation methodology with its suppliers that includes social performance targets. Furthermore, FWF encourages Albiro to systematically evaluate all of its suppliers and discuss such evaluations with its suppliers and collect their feedback.

Comment: Albiro sources its products from three different groups of suppliers. (see additional comments on purchasing practices). It has a lead time of 26 weeks for all its orders. In case of delays, Albiro considers splitting orders or air freight.

For group 1 suppliers, Albiro plans production in close cooperation with the factories. Albiro has a good understanding of the capacity of its suppliers. Albiro's technicians visit the suppliers regularly to check production planning and quality.

For group 2 suppliers, Albiro works through agents who do the production planning and check production. Delivery dates are discussed. The agents can shift production to other factories in case that a factory is already running on full capacity.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to further integrate its planning process with group 2 suppliers. It could share forecasts and also learn more about the production capacity of the factories that are used by its agents.

Comment: In general, FWF audits at group 1 suppliers with whom it closely cooperates to plan production confirm that no excessive overtime takes place. At one supplier in Macedonia, a FWF audit found that workers worked every Saturday. In Macedonia, workers are not allowed to work more than every other Saturday. Albiro discussed it with the supplier. Due to a management change, there was a change of working hours. Management agreed to ensure compliance with the Macedonian law on working hours. Albiro took steps through its integrated planning system to prevent workers from working every Saturday.

At group 2 suppliers in China and Turkey, FWF audit reports confirmed that excessive overtime took place. In general, Albiro only has limited leverage over these suppliers to effect changes. At two suppliers, other FWF members have more leverage and have taken the lead to follow up on the root causes of excessive overtime. At one Turkish supplier, communication with the agent is difficult, limiting Albiro's ability to follow up on excessive overtime. During visits at its Chinese suppliers, Albiro has raised the issue of excessive overtime. It is working with its agent to ensure that production planning does not contribute to excessive overtime. Especially with the Chinese suppliers, root causes of overtime are an overload of production capacity and workers asking for overtime hours.

Requirement: Albiro should investigate to what extent its current buying practices have an effect on the working hours at especially group 2 supplier level. It should work with its agents to improve production planning. A root cause analysis of excessive overtime should be done to investigate which steps can be most effective to reduce overtime.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to increase its leverage over its suppliers and actively cooperate with other customers at the factories to increase leverage when trying to mitigate excessive overtime hours.

Comment: For its group 1 suppliers, Albiro is working with standard minutes per style. It negotiates the cost per minute with the factory. It knows the country wage levels and the wage levels in the factory. It has not related the price per minute to the costs of direct labour, indirect labour and overhead. At one Macedonian factory where Albiro is doing a living wage-project, it has done a labour minute costing calculation and has learned how prices and wages relate to each other.

At its Moroccan supplier, Albiro has agreed to make sure order fill the factory's production capacity. Albiro pays for the production gaps to ensure that wages are paid.

With its group 2 suppliers, Albiro negotiates prices with its suppliers and compares those among suppliers. It has a pricing policy in place that states that Albiro would like to ensure that the manufacturer ensures the legal mimimum wage. Therefore, suppliers are asked to provide the cost of materials, CMT and agent fees. Through audits, it often knows about the wage levels in the factories.

Requirement: Albiro needs to develop a pricing policy for all its suppliers where Albiro knows the labour cost of garments and which allows the payment of at least legal minimum wages in production countries. It especially needs to learn more about the relationship between wages and prices at its group 2 suppliers.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to do labour minute costing calculations at all of its group 1 suppliers.

Comment: At one Moroccan supplier, a worker complained to the FWF worker helpline that several illiterate and low-skilled workers were not paid the legal minimum wage. This was confirmed by an on-site investigation. Albiro then investigated its prices and agreed to raise prices. Furthermore, it has entered in an on-going discussion with the supplier to include this group of workers in the regular workforce that earn a legal minimum wage.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to closely monitor the situation of this group of workers. An option could be that these workers become part of a regular workforce through training. In all cases, all workers active for the supplier should earn the legal minimum wage.

Comment: Albiro has participated in a FWF living wage project in Macedonia. Labour minute cost calculations were done, together with calculations to raise all wages above a certain target wage. In 2016, Albiro and the supplier managed to raise the wages to a specific target wage.

At other group 1 suppliers, Albiro has a good knowledge of wage levels. However, at its group 2 suppliers, it only has little insight into the wage structures of the factories due to incorrect or missing wage records.

Recommendation: FWF encourages to share its lessons learned at one of its suppliers to its other group 1 suppliers and start raising wages at other suppliers. It could also learn more from other FWF members how to market living wages to its customers.

Additional comments on Purchasing Practices:

The Albiro group exists of five brands. These are:

Albiro ag that produces work wear clothing, both project-based and Never Out of Stock-items

Wikland: work wear and Never Out of Stock-items for craftsmen.

Solida: specific work wear clothing focused on the health care sector

Marsum: work wear clothing for tradesmen and farmers

Frencys: ski wear

The Albiro group sources at three groups of suppliers:

- Group 1: Supplier only does CMT. Albiro delivers the material. Suppliers are from Macedonia, Morocco, Hungary, Slovakia and Bosnia.
- Group 2: Purchasing of models according to ALBIRO designs. Supplier gets the delivery date and sources the raw material. Suppliers are from China, Vietnam, India, Czech Republic, Portugal or Turkey.
- Group 3: Purchasing of non-ALBIRO labelled ready-made garments.

At FWF, group 1 and 2 are defined as "own production", group 3 as "external production".

Albiro started a strategy to reduce the amount of suppliers within the next three years and to work with few core suppliers only in the future.

Comment: In general, Albiro shares audit reports with the factories and sets up a timeline for improvements in a timely manner. At one Macedonian supplier, some of the issues were also discussed with the worker representatives. At a Turkish supplier, Albiro encountered difficulties to share the audit report with the factory due to its agent.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to ensure that it can share audit reports at all times with the factory, also in case of uncooperative agents.

Comment: Albiro has a system in place to verify progress on CAPs. It regularly discusses progress with suppliers and also does on-site monitoring at its group 1 suppliers. Most of its group 2 suppliers are BSCI-members. Albiro tracks progress through the BSCI system.

Albiro cooperated with its Macedonian suppliers to improve health and safety issues, overtime hours, involvement of workers and worker committees and living wages. In Bosnia, few issues remain at one factory according to a BSCI-audit.

A BSCI-audit report and a complaint through the FWF worker helpline made clear that its Moroccan supplier still needs to make significant improvements, for example on documentation, the payment of legal minimum wages and social security and prevent precarious work. Albiro has worked closely with the supplier to improve pricing, production planning and other issues.

Most of its group 2 suppliers still need significant improvements, for example on excessive overtime. In 2016, Albiro visited several of its Chinese suppliers to discuss CAPs and labour standards. In Turkey, Albiro joined efforts of another FWF member at one factory to investigate whether Syrian refugees were employed, prevent subcontracting and discuss health and safety issues. Improvements were made but could not yet be verified.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to further enhance its system to track and follow up on CAPs. It should not close CAPs unless sufficient proof has been provided or verification has been done.

FWF encourages Albiro to continue working on more complex issues at its group 1 suppliers, e.g. on social dialogue, gender and living wages.

FWF encourages Albiro to take further steps to consolidate the number of group 2 suppliers. FWF recommends Albiro to include actively its intermediaries in following up on issues, especially to ensure that more severe findings, like missing production records, Albiro must ensure that remediation measures are being implemented in a timely manner. Albiro can hire local consultants or request a FWF audit or monitoring visit to verify improvements.

Comment: As a BSCI-member, Albiro has access to both FWF audit reports and BSCI audit reports. In case of a shared factory, the BSCI-system requires that the member with the most leverage checks whether the factory has set up a CAP and needs to follow up. It has collected audit reports from most of its factories. It assesses the quality of the report. With factories that are not in the tail end, Albiro has set up a CAP and is actively following up. With factories that are in the tail end, Albiro monitors progress but does not always set up a CAP and actively follow up.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to work with other brands to ensure that a CAP is actively followed up, also for suppliers in the tail end.

Comment: Albiro has a country policy in place which does not allow sourcing from Myanmar and Bangladesh, neither does it use abrasive blasting for its products.

The CSR officer is aware of human rights risks per country that Albiro sources from, but it has not yet been fully integrated into its organizational and decision-making processes. Albiro has discussed employment of Syrian refugees and subcontracting with its Turkish suppliers. With its Macedonian partners, it is working towards fulfillment of freedom of association. Albiro is cooperating with its Chinese agent to limit excessive overtime at its Chinese factories by improving production planning.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to more systematically analyze human rights risks per country and integrate that into its organizational and decision-making processes. Per country, it could assess and mitigate risks, set priorities and develop possible solutions.

FWF has developed the Factory Guide, an innovative and comprehensive e-learning tool to increase awareness of factory managers on FWF requirements and labour standards. FWF recommends Albiro to ensure suppliers actively use the Factory Guide.

Comment: At its group 1 suppliers, Albiro is aware of subcontracting. Due to its integrated planning of production and on-site visits of technicians, Albiro knows which subcontractors are used during production.

With its group 2 suppliers, Albiro encounters more difficulties to identify all subcontractors. It discusses subcontracting with all its suppliers. Furthermore, it regularly checks quality and learns of subcontracting through BSCI and FWF audit reports. It also tries to involve its agents in the prevention of illegal subcontracting, like through on-site visits. In Turkey, it has discussed subcontracting with the supplier. A FWF audit confirmed that subcontracting was done by the supplier, but for another FWF member. At its other Turkish supplier, due to an uncooperative agent, Albiro is not yet aware of potential subcontractors.

Recommendation: FWF recommends Albiro to periodically check with its agents whether all known production locations are still up to date and use the information coming from questionnaire to update supplier data, including subcontractors. Furthermore, FWF recommends Albiro to require agents to be informed about the production location before the order starts.
